AREAS OF WORK

1. Promoting micro, small and medium entreprises



ONE VILLAGE, ONE PRODUCT

The One-Village-One-Product model has been implemented in 18 villages to promote handicraft and cottage industry development.



SKILLS FOR ENTREPRENEURS

Upgraded the technical, vocational education and training programmes to enhance employability and promote entrpreneurship.



A DEVELOPMENT NETWORK

Supported the development of business clusters and connected them to main markets.

2. Boosting agriculture



SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE

Introduced sustainable agricultural practices in Upper Egypt including crop residue recycling, community milk processing and backyard poultry raising.



FARMER FIELD SCHOOLS

Farmer Field Schools support farmers technically and raise awareness of best practices in farming and agriculture.

UPGRADED QUALITY OF LIFE

ENID is providing innovative joint literacy and sewing classes, has opened pre-schools, provided health services and upgraded the operations and curriculum of youth centres in Qena.
